Passion and Performance

Presentation Summary:

Thomas Phoenix is a Principal with the Architectural/Engineering firm of Moser Mayer Phoenix Associates located in Greensboro, NC, USA. He serves as Vice President and Director of Engineering. He has a B.S. degree in engineering from NC State University. He is a Registered Professional Engineer in North Carolina and six other States and has over 30 years of experience in the design, operation and maintenance of building mechanical systems.

Mr. Phoenix has been an active member of ASHRAE (American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air Conditioning Engineers) since 1982, and was elevated to the grade of Fellow in 2011. He is an ASHRAE Presidential Member, having served as Society President in 2014-15. He previously served terms on ASHRAE's Board of Directors as Society Treasurer, Society Vice President, as a Director at Large, and as Director and Regional Chairman of Region IV. His past ASHRAE activities also include serving as the Chair of ASHRAE's Members Council, and as the Chair of numerous ASHRAE committees and task groups. Mr. Phoenix is an ASHRAE certified Building Energy Modeling Professional (BEMP) and Building Energy Assessment Professional (BEAP). Mr. Phoenix is active in his local community. He is a graduate of Leadership Greensboro, a member of the Leadership Greensboro Alumni Association and a past member of the Board of Trustees for the Greensboro Children's Museum.

In February we had a joint meeting with CEJC. Vincent Halma gave an interesting presentation on an array of forklifts which can handle loads as large as a shipping container to machines which are used in retail stores. Over 10,000 custom features are available for the devices.

Jonathan Jackson gave a very interesting presentation at our January meeting. Variable refrigerant flow is useful in cheap, simple HVAC systems and in more complex systems. A VRF system uses smaller pipe than a chilled water system to distribute cooling to various parts of a building. VRF can be used in ducted and in non-ducted systems. VRF controls can be installed at the factory and can be accessed via laptop. With VRF the return on investment is enhanced by lower maintenance.

Thermostats can have occupancy sensors including infrared and other systems.

Energy savings of 20 to 40% may be obtained by using VRF. Weight and required space on roof are reduced by using VRF. Maintain power supply at +/- 10% of rated voltage. The VRF systems are typically air-cooled. With no cooling tower, there is no danger of Legionnaires' disease. The system can have a bank of multiple outdoor units. It is not necessary to have 50 tons of equipment running when the load is 10 tons. The electronic expansion valve has many steps of opening so only the required flow is provided. A system with open protocol may be obtained so that BACNET and other systems may be connected.

ASHRAE 15 limits the amount of refrigerant to 26 pounds for a 10'X10'X10' space. Now it is possible to have a refrigerant detector in the room and satisfy the code. A charge of refrigerant must be added, 15 to 35# to fill piping plus enough to charge the condenser. Hotel rooms are not allowed to have door grilles so any refrigerant leak could be trapped in the room. One outdoor unit typically serves 10-15 rooms. In one hotel room four users of hairspray triggered the refrigerant alarm. The equipment cost is equal for one 24-ton system and for two 12-ton systems but the installation cost is cheaper with the single system. Piping should be pressure tested at 550 PSI and vacuum tested at 550 microns (0.0106 PSIA).

Because refrigerant is heavier than air, refrigerant sensors must be installed under the beds. There is no refrigerant manufacturer in the US. The DOD can buy from friendly nations.

Touch screens and thermostats can be obtained with the capability to lock out control so that building occupants cannot cause problems. Third party kits can be obtained so that one company's AHU's may be connected to a VRF system. In one project, a water coil was removed and a DX coil was installed in the AHU.

An energy recovery system for a lab used heat pipe technology to avoid cross contamination.

Members are encouraged to take advantage of the ASHRAE certification program. Certifications include: Energy Assessment Professional (BEAP); Building Energy Modeling Professional (BEMP); Commissioning Process Management Professional (CPMP); Healthcare Facility Design Professional (HFDP); High-Performance Building Design Professional (HBDP) and Operations & Performance Management Professional (OPMP)
